# Chair's Report

## Meeting Council Leader and Corporate Director of Regeneration.

Having offered our thanks to the council officers for their support for Liquorice Shoots, the remainder of our one hour long meeting covered delays in numerous projects, such as various highways schemes, Monkhill Station footbridge and lifts project, North Baileygate, Horsefair Streets for People. We also can't have a meeting without strongly raising the issue of failed bollards in the pedestrianised area, as well as the importance that our voice is heard on Highways & Streetscene cross-departmental opportunities for improvements in Pontefract Park.

Our support remains firm for Pontefract Collieries managing a new community centre and skatepark.

We have previously raised the poor use of the Safe Space in the town hall, where we have put a proposal to the council, which hasn't been fully considered and responded to.

Finally, the 2024 Regeneration meetings with departments and elected members, as we predicted, has not worked for Pontefract Civic Society and fails to deliver opportunities for engagement outlined in our Memorandum of Understanding. This point was taken on board by Mark Lynam, and changes are now in hand, as we revert to our own meeting with all relevant department senior managers. We'll report on progress in our next issue of Pontefract Voice.

- 150 carbon-neutral rental homes likely to be developed in 2025, though a developer has yet to be appointed

- The long-term council planning officer for the site, Ian Garrett, has retired, and future planning developments will be overseen by Fiona Knowles
- The country park groundworks are now being delivered by Mone Bros with plans to fill the lagoon
- Community Centre discussions continue at a glacial pace with the Duchy of Lancaster, CISWO involved too
- £40k natural play equipment in the pipeline, between the current housing and the country park. Tim Johnson, Streetscene managing the project
- Anti-social behaviour on Lake View, off Skinner Lane (and off the development) was raised with elected members
- The next meeting will be in November.

## Production Park – an amazing collective

**People just don't know what's on their doorstep, and that was the reaction for 20 members who attended a very open and welcoming visit to Production Park in South Kirkby on Thursday 29 August.**



With thanks to Jim Farmery, Director of External Affairs, and our guide, Sam, who were most accommodating on the 1.5 hour visit around a number of studios, workshops, and technical areas of this expanding site at Langthwaite Grange industrial estate. Production Park with its partner businesses employs several hundred people on a daily basis, with the head count increasing dramatically on a temporary basis when entertainers and their teams are creating, rehearsing, and filming global touring productions. The site has its own restaurant, hotel and small cinema, the latter having been used by Hugh Jackman to preview the final cut of one of his films.

There's also a strategic eye on the future in not just delivering today's shows but training young people from manufacturing to lighting and sound, and production management, to name but just a few of the skills through the various trades and businesses on site. Education and building the skilled workforce of the future is really important through Backstage Academy, and the potential for Production Park to soon become a fully accredited university. The latter will remove the stigma of the former mining area and the label that Wakefield has, of being the largest city in Europe without a university.

It's no understatement to that this was an incredible visit, and we were all so impressed with the vision and innovation going on just a few miles from Pontefract.

# Allan Roy Blaza

## Obituary

It was with deep sadness that I had to advise members that our last surviving co-founder, Allan R Blaza, aged 99, passed away in Dewsbury Hospital in the early hours of yesterday, Weds 3 Jul, 2024, following a stroke at home some months earlier.

Christine and I had visited him in Dewsbury a few weeks earlier, where we also met Hugh, for the first time, Allan's son. Allan was instrumental in creating Pontefract & District Civic Trust between Feb and May 1969, having been approached by a number of leading ladies and businesswomen who had attended a meeting of Doncaster Civic Trust. In his time, Allan was Secretary, a trustee, a member of a number of subcommittees, and a past President. With an interest in architecture and the built environment, Allan had a keen eye for detail. On 6 March, 2012, Allan was made a Honorary Member, for his outstanding contribution to Pontefract Civic Society in a number of key roles over a forty year period. Now, going back to where it all started, he was on good terms with our first Patron, Lady Rosse of Womersley Hall, so much so that she managed to bring well-known people to the civic trust's annual dinners at the town hall. The first special guest was Sir John Betjeman, followed the next year by Sir Nikolaus Pevsner – the famous author of books on the counties. Patrick Moore OBE was next, which coincided with the building and opening of the Rosse Observatory in Carleton, Lady Dartmouth the next year. The most notable was the mother in law of Lady Rosse, Princess Margaret. Allan recalled that the Princess chain-smoked through dinner without engaging in much conversation, and Allan's wife Shirley had the task of ensuring the ladies loos were

abundant with fresh flowers on that special occasion. Lady Rosse also established the Façade of the Year Award in 1975, which remains a feature our current annual Design Awards; these things were dear to Allan's heart.

Causes championed by Allan included the creation of The Mount conservation area, with his good friend, Peter Dewes, lime tree planting in Woolmarket, and with the intervention and support of English Heritage he influenced the pedestrian areas redevelopment with stone setts. Bringing colour to the town centre streetscape, minimising what he called "magnolia row" was another interest of Allan's ensuring architectural detail and individuality of each building were evident. He loved talking about and showing visitors around Pontefract Town Hall, where he was also a member of the former Town Hall Management Committee, which spearheaded several rounds of refurbishments between 1975 to 2005.

Many more civic society stories were recounted during our 50th Anniversary year in 1969, though it is worth adding that on a personal level, I first met Allan long before my time in the civic society, when I worked with him and for his brother, Anthony, as a trainee chartered surveyor from 1975 to 1979. Our friendship continued across the subsequent decades. The funeral service was attended by past and present members of Pontefract Civic Society, including our Patron, Michael Fox DL. This was a thanksgiving service made even more special with the family tributes and some great singing from Pontefract Choral Society; Jane, Allan's daughter, and his granddaughter joined the ensemble. Allan's late wife, Shirley was a member of the ensemble and Allan was a Patron, so there was a huge family connection. After the service, friends and family gathered at Kings Croft Hotel where further contributions were read from friends, a family member from Canada had flown over, our Chair Paul Cartwright spoke, along with others from Probus, Ackworth & Pontefract British Legion, and Dave Hogg. We heard about Allan's love for his family, and way beyond that to conservation, cars, curling, and country houses.

## Pontefract Delivery Group meeting highlights



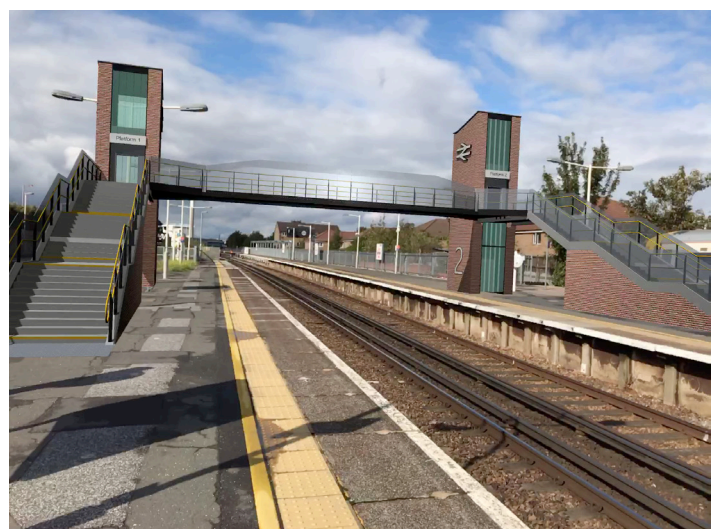
**Dispensary/Hermitage:** Numerous issues to be resolved through Homes England, and the council needs to address the parking strategy before the NHS staff car park can be relocated.

**Businesses** should also by now be aware that the council has extended its £6k shop security grants scheme to town centre locations; monies must be spent by 31 March, 2025.

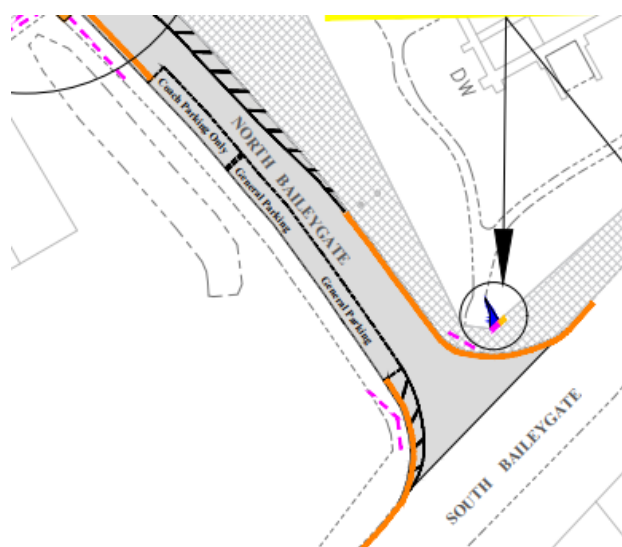
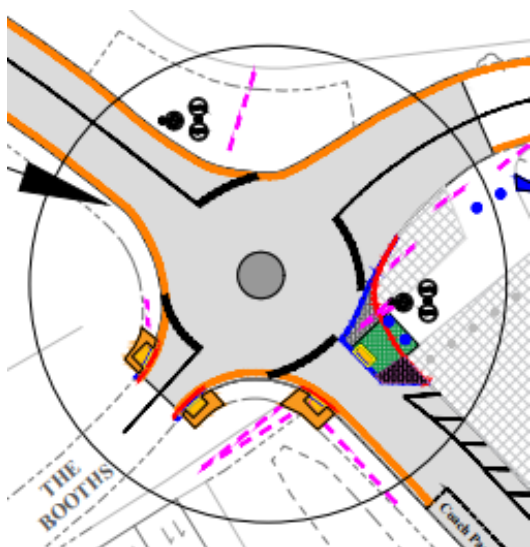
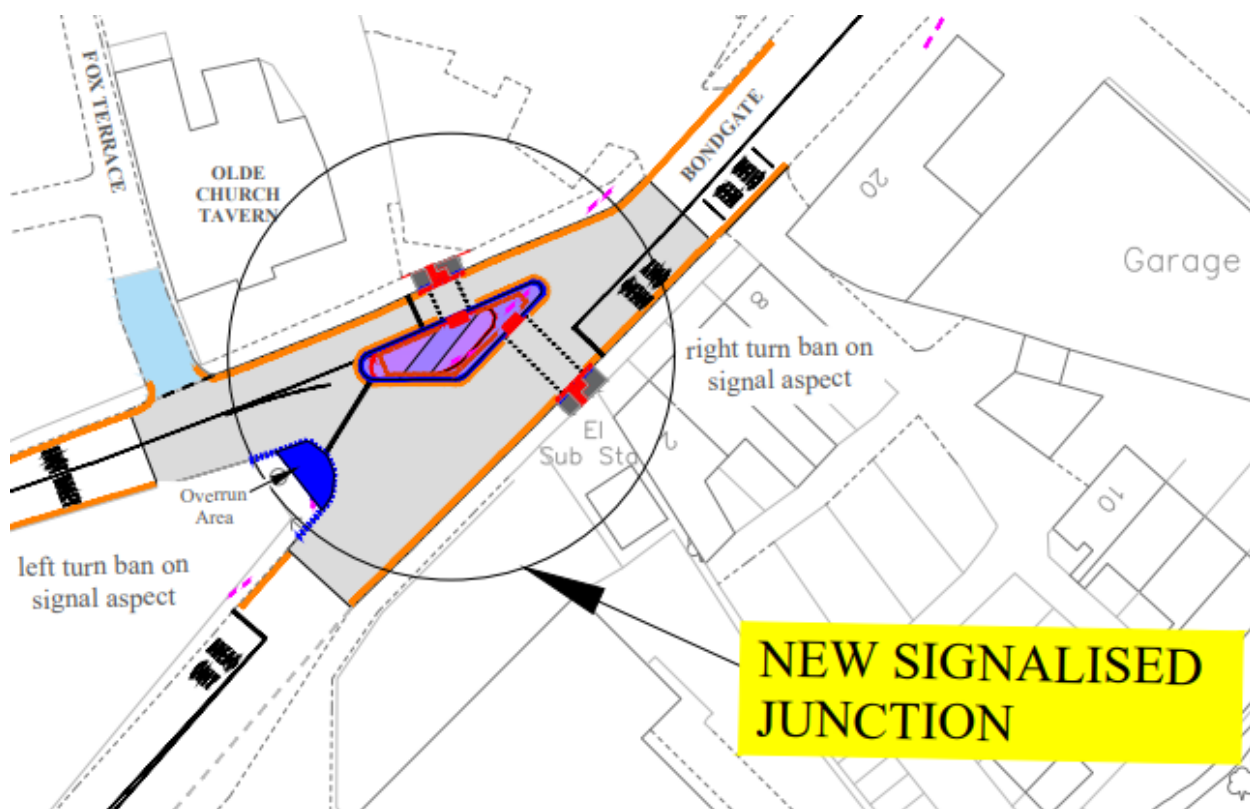

# Crier John proclaims, informs, listens

## "OYEZ!" is what I hear every Wednesday

As I walk past All Saints Church & then by Pontefract Castle on my way to the Buttercross, I wish everyone "Morning!", "Good morning, Ma'am!", "A very good morning to you young sir!" or some such greeting.

Throughout the year I share posts on Facebook, X, & Instagram promoting 'What's On' in Pontefract. In May this year I decided to add something extra to my promotions. Each week since the start of June 2024 I have made weekly proclamations; every Wednesday by the Buttercross, & outside Pontefract Museum.

When I'm walking around Pontefract in my Town Crier livery I'm usually stopped & asked a variety of questions. From "What are you doing?" to "Are you a pirate? Compliments are sometimes given & gratefully received by a thank you, a raising of my tricorne hat & a slight bow.

As well as the proclamations I asked Pontefract Library if I might sit at a table on a Wednesday morning & chat to visitors about What's On. The staff at the library were and are most accommodating & helped with creating posters and also displayed them inside the library. I remember the first Wednesday in June as my first visitor sat down & we started chatting. I quickly realised that she thought I was a council representative. Councillors were sitting at another table & dealt with the enquiry. I did advise that I am a member of a local charity, Pontefract Civic Society and not a member of the council! The poster produced by the library team to support my weekly visits shows that my role is part of Pontefract Civic Society which champions and supports my volunteering as Town Crier. As well as advertising events, I'm also an active participant of some of the activities, and recently, I've attended and promoted Liquorice Shoots where I was invited to be the stage compere, and Yorkshire Day in Friarwood Valley Gardens.

The proclamations on a Wednesday morning have covered a range of events including Pontefract Civic Society monthly talks, Music on a Sunday at Pontefract Castle during August, Mindfulness Mondays, The Hatchling & September's Heritage Open Days.

From 09:30 'til midday every Wednesday in June, July & August I have sat down at my table. The table has a variety of booklets & pamphlets for visitors to browse and take away. Over the three months it has been a privilege to chat



with people who don't just want to talk about What's-On in Pontefract. There is a confidentiality, but I do like to know what events they have visited in the past. Then I suggest what they might like to see & do in the future. For the first session in June, I was almost overwhelmed and was listening and talking for all of the morning. Whether it be 13 or 3 visitors, every week is interesting for me & I hope that the visitors have enjoyed our chat and maybe gone away with events that they might attend.

One of the biggest events of the year for Pontefract Civic Society is The Heritage Open Days in September. As well as promoting the daily events I'll also visit as many talks and tours as I am able. After the Heritage Open Days finish, I will have a few days to relax & then prepare for my next OYEZ.

## WheelFest24 and 1940's Ropergate Success

On Saturday 8 Jun, we staged WheelFest24, which was a spectacular success approaching 80 exhibiting vehicles, 20 outdoor displays, rides, and vendors, 22 indoor craft stalls, 20 craft and charity stalls around Market Place, and 16 costumed characters on parade led by our Town Crier, John Turner. We hope you enjoyed WheelFest24 and 1940's Day Ropergate.

The 1940's bit was our first trial event, but certainly won't be the last. We have the date of 14th June 2025 for this unique combined event already in our diaries, please add it to yours.

The event was officially opened at 10am by the Cllr Darren Byford, Mayor of Wakefield Council, who toured the exhibits, stalls and craft fair accompanied by our chair, Paul Cartwright, in the morning.

I was immensely proud of the team-effort and partner support that we achieved in pulling off our biggest community event to date. The businesses on Ropergate got into the 1940's spirit dressing windows and in some case, themselves, the street displays from the Decoration Squad and the stage entertainment went down a storm.

Karen Haddock and Lynne Hartley, KLH Craft Fair, said, "We had a fantastic day with around 1000 visitors coming through the doors of St Giles Church, whom we thank on this occasion for accommodating us; that was 400 up on WheelFest23".

Paul Cartwright added "This was our most ambitious event to date, and in spite of early rain and the wind, the feedback for everyone has been really positive and encouraging. Some competitions on the day were held. Pontefract's Mark Barnes' 1977 Pontiac Firebird Transam won the best 4 wheel vehicle and above, and Knottingley's Colin Ashmore's Rewako RFI 2004 trike won the best three wheel vehicle and below, judged by Castleford Tigers players. Also, young Cameron Johnson won the best recycled model which was a school bus made from a drinks carton. Once again, we want to thank all our business sponsors".

WheelFest25 will take place on Saturday 14 Jun, 2025. Entries have not opened yet, and we believe next year will be bigger and better.

As you may well know, the Royal British Legion is known for the annual poppy appeal, and our emblem, the red poppy.

Every year, the RBL mobilise a countrywide network of Poppy Appeal collectors to meet the huge public demand for poppies, the nation's symbol of Remembrance.



The Ackworth and Pontefract Branch is well advanced in their planning for this year's appeal. Our Poppy Appeal Organisers Roger and Janice Kirby have taken delivery of stock and are now looking to arrange collection stalls which will be located at various supermarkets across both Ackworth and Pontefract from late October up until Armistice Day.

During the annual Poppy Appeal our volunteers, local cadet units and schools make a real difference to the lives of people in the Armed Forces community, with the area of Ackworth and Pontefract generously donating a total of £250,000 over the last 7 years.



However, our organisers (past and present) and the members of the branch cannot do this without willing volunteers to help collecting at our stalls, and although we benefit greatly from a small network of local people, who selflessly give up their time on our many stalls, we always look for more volunteers who want to do their bit and help.
